Art

Join different materials and explore different textures. Make marks with different mark making materials. 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Year 1

Drawing – Make your mark

Exploring mark making and line; working and experimenting with different materials through observational and collaborative pieces.

Key End Points:

By the end of this unit children will be able to:

- Develop some control when using a wide range of tools to draw, paint and create crafts and sculptures.
- Make choices about which materials to use to create an effect.

Painting and mixed media: Colour splash

Exploring colour mixing through paint play, using a range of tools to paint on different surfaces and creating paintings inspired by Clarice Cliff and Jasper Johns.

Key End Points:

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- Make choices about which materials to use to create an effect.

Sculpture and 3D: Paper play

Creating simple three dimensional shapes and structures using familiar materials, children develop skills in manipulating paper and card. They fold, roll and scrunch materials to make their own sculptures.

Key End Points:

By the end of this unit children will be able to:

- Develop some control when using a wide range of tools to draw, paint and create crafts and sculptures.
- Explore and analyse a wider variety of ways to join and fix materials in place.
